1947

Around this same time, a German researcher named Hoffman synthesizes LSD and experiments with it on himself.

Hofmann (sp.) synthesized LSD in 1938 and tried it in 1943. Not just "a German researcher," he is honored in the US and elsewhere at regular intervals. He will be 100 in February. I think I told you I wrote to him last December and got a beautiful hand-written page and a half letter in reply.

1951:

Sandoz pharmaceuticals, a Swiss company, agrees to an exclusive contract with the US Government to deliver 100 grams a week of LSD, and not to provide any to communist countries.

Harold Abramson proposes to the CIA an \$85,000 study of the effects of LSD on unwitting hospital patients. Funding for this project was funneled through the Macy Foundation.

Scientists working with SOD (CIA) administer LSD to one another; one of these, Dr. Olson, is permanently affected and later jumps out of a window (?) in a Washington DC hotel while under the care of a CIA handler. Harold Abramson is the attending physician.

Olson went through a window, alreight (in 1953, not 1951), but evidence indicates he could not have jumped. His CIA "handler"

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was Lashley, who called Gottlieb and, according to the telephone eavesdropping hotel operator, said "he's gone" and Gottlieb simply said "good."

late 50s:

CIA arranges cut-out contracts with The Geschikter Foundation, the Josiah Macy Foundation, and the Society for the Investigation of Human Ecology, for human-subjects tests on LSD.

It was actually the early 50s. Wolff was my neurology mentor and squash-playing partner in 1954, and was planning to visit me at EA to review our program in early 1962 when he collapsed and died in Van Sim's arms at a secret Washington DC meeting one day before Valentine's Day!

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The Army Chemical Corps. administers LSD to 1000 American soldiers ("volunteers") who then participated in a series of tests concerning battlefield performance. 95 "volunteers" were subsequently tested to evaluate the potential of LSD as an intelligence weapon. These tests were actually hidden from the CIA.

The number 1,000 is just one of many inaccurate estimes — some say 2,000. Actual number according to McFarling's followup, was less than 600 before I arrived, and about 100 between 61 and 66. The testing was discussed in full detail with the CIA, and the 100 we tested were not tested for LSD's potential as an intelligence weapon. It was straightforward clinical psychopharm, as you know, with emphasis on drug parameters. It was the "cutout" projects by the CIA that was not shared with us (Med Labs). Van Sim and Ernie Clovis were working with the CIA unbenownst to me, giving LSD to overseas unwitting subjects.
